



The Bishop's Expectations of the Episcopal Parish of Alton

I have been using these monthly *Angelus* articles to write about things that are important for our Parish. In the past few months, I have written on my first impressions of the Parish as I came to be your Interim Rector, and on the rationale and practical aspects of pledging to the parish church.



For this month (September) and for next month (October) I would like to write on two subjects that are very important for our Parish in the next few months. In this article I will write about the Bishop's expectations of us as a Parish, and in October I will re-visit the practice of pledging, specifically as it applies to our Pledge Campaign coming up in November.

In the Episcopal way of Church life, each Parish is a member of a Diocese—the Episcopal Parish of Alton is a member of the Diocese of Springfield. The Diocese is led by a Diocesan Bishop—in our case, Bishop Brian Burgess. The Bishop does not have unlimited authority and power, but he does have a lot; as a Parish, we need to pay attention to and take seriously his expectations of us.

Bishop Burgess has been "pro-active" toward our Parish since the beginning of his Episcopate. He played a big part in negotiating a settlement between the Parish and Mother Cindy, took a lead role in securing the services of Mother Edie Bird to lead us in the reconciliation process, and actively recruited me to be your Interim Rector. I believe all these actions of Bishop Burgess have helped us to move to a more stable position as a Parish.

But there is, of course, more to be done. Uppermost in our minds, and in the mind of Bishop Burgess, is the calling of a new Rector for the Episcopal Parish of Alton. But in order to do so, there are certain criteria which the Bishop rightly expects us to meet. For the sake of this article, we can narrow it down to two.

First, we must attain a level of financial stability that will enable us to fairly compensate a new Rector. This is why I have written extensively (and will continue to do so) about the importance of our upcoming Pledge Campaign, and the need for every parishioner to, at least, give it serious consideration.

The monies pledged by the parishioners of a Parish are the very heart of a Parish's financial soundness and a concrete indicator of a Parish's "spiritual health." Investment income is a tempting answer, but in my experience, using investment income has a way of morphing into using investment principal, which constantly decreases until one day we wake up and realize it is gone—kind of like killing the goose that lays the golden eggs. Investment income can be a valuable supplement or a lifeline in times of crisis, but to depend on it is a very risky venture. It is the Parish's financial pledge base that gives a Parish, at least in part, the "spiritual muscle" to do the work God has given it to do.

The second expectation that the Bishop has of us is an increase in average Sunday attendance—a fancy phrase for how many people attend the Parish's weekly celebration of the Holy Eucharist on Sundays.

Let me be a bit more direct than I usually am to make this point clearly; the Parish that has "members" who do not regularly participate in the work of "praise and thanksgiving" to God at the Sunday Eucharist, and who do not regularly receive the Sacrament of the Body and Blood of Christ for their spiritual nourishment, suffers from an organic anemia in its Parish life. This stems from the fact that the Church is not merely a "group" or an "institution"; it is a unique, living, spiritual organism—the Body of Christ, animated by the life of Christ. While participating in the worship of the Church and receiving the Sacrament of Christ's Body and Blood may not seem important—even optional—to a "group" or an "institution," it is a rock-solid necessity for the health and vitality of a Parish as the Body of Christ.

This is what lies behind Bishop Burgess's expectation of us for an upward trend in average Sunday church attendance. In the same manner as our pledge base, Sunday church attendance is a concrete indicator of the "spiritual and ministry muscle" of the Parish, a commitment and willingness to do the work God has called us to do in the Episcopal Parish of Alton.

I believe that these two expectations of Bishop Burgess are realistic and proper. I also believe that they are attainable goals for our Parish, with God's help. It is a common feeling for us, who live in a world immersed in the material and secular culture of our time, to be blind to the possibilities that God has for us. Please remember, this is not just about us having our comfortable Parish Church; everything I've written is also about God's desire and will for the Episcopal Parish of Alton to be a beacon of light in a dark world to those in our communities who so desperately need the grace and love of God in their lives.

At the same meeting, the Vestry approved a resolution on "Pledge Campaign 2024" that elaborates our plan for the process of gathering pledges for next year. Expect to see a letter and pledge card in the mail in October. Fr. Kip has talked about the importance of pledging in previous newsletters, also noting that the Bishop expects us to attain a level of financial stability that will enable us to fairly compensate a new Rector. It wouldn't be right to call a priest and then, in say a year or two, to tell the priest that we don't have money to pay him or her. We will not be addressing our financial situation with a sense of lack and fear, however. We are approaching everything with trust in God and a sense of love and gratitude for this parish family!

Fr. Kip will be on vacation from September 3rd-15th. While he is away, I am pleased to report that Fr. John Henry will be our Supply Priest on Sundays, September 3rd and 10th. Fr. Henry was here last year, so we are somewhat familiar with each other. Please give him a warm welcome!

Ann Bowen, our new Office Assistant, now has regular office hours Monday through Thursday, 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon. Please note that she will be out of the office September 18th-22nd, however. Ann will be keeping a master calendar for the parish, so please let her know about any scheduled events—you may call the office at 618-465-9149 or email her at episcopalalton@gmail.com and put "Calendar event" in the subject line.

Nancy Weiss-Hayes, head of the Altar Guild, notes that our Flower Fund is low on funds, which means that there may be some Sundays that we don't have flowers on the altar at St. Paul's. As always, individuals may donate flowers in honor or memory of loved ones. If you wish to give money for flowers, please make your check out to the Altar Guild. Major Feast Days of the Episcopal Church To Be Celebrated in September


Fr. Kip will continue celebrating the Principal Feasts and Major Feasts of the liturgical Calendar with Holy Eucharist held at noon at Trinity Chapel.

Holy Cross Day-September 14th

This feast day may be celebrated privately. There will be no noon Mass as Fr. Kip will be out of town this week.

On this day we give honor to Christ's self-offering on the cross for our salvation. The collect for the day recalls that Christ was "lifted up high upon the cross that he might draw the whole world unto himself," and prays that "we, who glory in the mystery of our redemption, may have grace to take up our cross and follow him" (*BCP*, p. 192).





The Feast of Saint Matthew, Apostle and Evangelist— September 22nd (transferred from September 23rd)

St. Matthew was a tax collector working for the Roman government in Capernaum. It is said that when Jesus passed him by, Jesus invited him quite simply with the words, "Follow me!" At once, Matthew left everything and followed Jesus. Matthew became a loyal disciple and evangelist. Levi was his original name, but "Matthew," meaning "gift from God," was given to him after he became a disciple.

The Gospel of Matthew has been attributed to him even though some scholars have insisted that it seems so unlikely that this gospel could have

been written by a former Galilean tax collector. Matthew is venerated as a martyr; however, the time and circumstances of his death are unknown.

The Feast of Saint Michael and All Angels—September 29th

The word "angel" (Greek: *angelos*) literally means "a messenger." Only four angels are called by name in Scripture: Michael, Gabriel, Uriel and Raphael. Angels are pictured in many ways in Christian art—wings, with or without swords, dazzling raiment or as mythical beasts. Angels can assume human and non-human forms and are powerful agents of God.

The Archangel Michael is the powerful angel who "wards off evil from God's people and delivers peace to them at the end of this life's mortal struggle." Angels in many forms protect us, defend us, lead us, and watch over us.



Michaelmas, a feast in England as well as in other countries, is a popular celebration in the Christian year. Michael is the patron saint of many churches and is considered a champion of justice, a healer of the sick, and a guardian of the Church. He also plays a big part in the Revelation of St. John.

From the Organ Loft

Beginning Friday, October 5th, St. Paul's musicians will be launching a new fall rehearsal experiment. As most of you are aware, on Sunday mornings Roy and I don't arrive at St. Paul's from the Trinity service until 9:30 at the earliest. With the change in time for the 2nd service to 10:30, this just won't allow enough time for a proper rehearsal.

Last Sunday after the service at St. Paul's, Fr. Kip, Susan, Jeanie, Roy and I met to try to come up with an alternative solution. Since I have been coming to Alton once a week during the day to practice on the new organ at Trinity (and also at St. Paul's when it is cool enough in the church that I won't fry in the loft), we suggested a Friday daytime rehearsal from 2:00-3:30 p.m. I sent out an email to our musicians and have had an overwhelmingly positive response!

We may not meet every week, and for now will concentrate on bells only. We will still have some "mini" 20 minute rehearsals on Sunday morning when we are playing on that particular day, but the bulk of learning new music and getting "organized" will be relegated to the Friday practices.

Let's Walk for Good Health and Fellowship!




