From the Senior Warden...

On Ash Wednesday, our Church invites us into Lent this way (BCP, page 265): “I invite you, therefore, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God’s holy Word.” A little over a week into Lent as I write this, and I have thought about these words. My actions would indicate otherwise. “Too much to do; I will get to it later”... those things, “stuff” as Father Stormer mentioned in his sermon, need to be put aside for us to immerse ourselves in a holy Lent. I’ll keep trying. Will you?



Many opportunities for spiritual growth can be found during this Lenten season. Wednesday Lenten services are just 30 minutes long. Afterwards, enjoy a soup, bread, and cheese supper. Following will be a video program and discussion. Expect to be finished and heading home by 8:00 p.m. or earlier. Father Stormer will not be here for two of the Wednesday services. On February 28th, I guided us through the Stations of the Cross and presented the second session of *The New Testament You Never Knew*. On March 6th, Susan Lukasik will lead us in Evening Prayer and again, I will be presenting the third session of the video program. The final two services and programs will be on March 13th and 20th; Father Stormer will be back from his cruise then.

Evening services of Holy Week begin on Maundy Thursday with a 7:00 p.m. service. Father John Henry will be our supply priest Maundy Thursday through Easter. Check the calendar for the specific times for services on Good Friday, Easter Vigil (Saturday) and Easter.

On March 1st, Vestry and the Search Committee are planning a “Signing Celebration” to sign the agreement papers for our new Priest-in-Charge, Father Garron Daniels. We want to mark this occasion with all the joy we feel! For the celebratory signing, we will gather at Bakers & Hale Restaurant.

Do take the time to read the reports of Vestry which are posted on the bulletin board at St. Paul’s and Trinity. We have seven very active commissions that work hard to keep this parish running smoothly. Several of the commissions are recruiting parish members to join them. If you are interested in becoming more involved, let a Vestry member know.

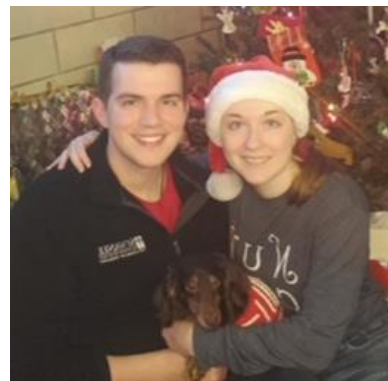
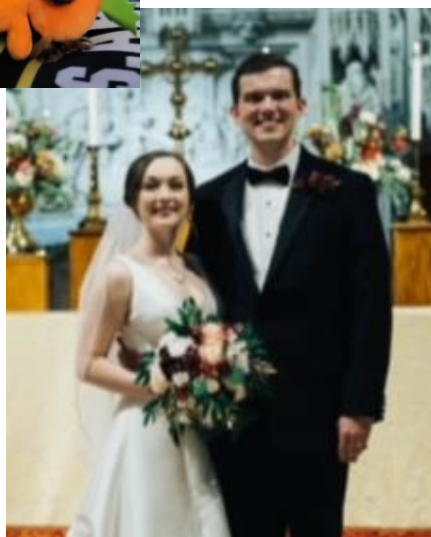
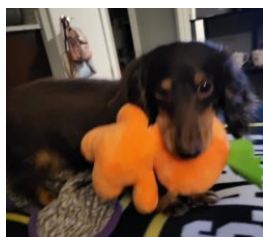

The Rev. Garron C. Daniels to Be Our Next Priest

The Reverend Garron C. Daniels, OCS, has been called to be the Priest-in-Charge of the Episcopal Parish of Alton. Fr. Garron currently serves as the Curate at St. Timothy's Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Missouri and as a PRN Chaplain at St. Louis Children's Hospital. He attended Truman State University in Kirksville, MO, receiving a Bachelor's of Science in Justice Systems, Magna Cum Laude. He went on to study for his Masters of Divinity at the University of the South: School of Theology. In 2022, he was a recipient of the Griffin Fellowship and partook in ministry formation in the Holy Land at St. George's College. Fr. Garron finds himself drawn towards Christian Formation and the Liturgy of the Church, especially the Rite of Reconciliation. He is also a member of the Guild of All Souls, an At-Large member of the Provincial Council of the Society of Catholic Priests, and a founding member of Order of Christ the Saviour. Fr. Garron is married to his college sweetheart, Nathalia Baum, and together they have a short haired mini dachshund, Maggie.

From the Organ Loft



*I want Jesus to walk with me.
I want Jesus to walk with me.
All along my pilgrim journey,
Lord, I want Jesus to walk with me.*

A spiritual that is frequently programmed during Lent and contemplative services is *I Want Jesus to Walk with Me*. It is part of a group of African American Spirituals that are known as “journey songs.” Other well-known “journey spirituals” are *Wayfaring Stranger* and *Jesus Walked this Lonesome Valley*. These “journey songs” address the desire and the consistent call for God’s presence in our life’s “walk.”

It is not unusual for a spiritual to have an unknown source; rather, this is the norm for this genre of music. In her book *In Their Own Words*, Eileen Guenther writes,

Spirituals are folk songs, the spontaneous utterances of those who originally sang them. They are the fruit of the creative capacity of an entire people rather than of individuals. They give voice to the joys, sorrows, and aspirations of that people and, in so doing, they reveal the influences of the environment from which they sprang (Guenther, 10).

James Cone, an African American theologian and prolific author, writes of the nature of spirituals:

The spirituals are historical songs which speak about the rupture of black lives; they tell us about a people in the land of bondage, and what they did to hold themselves together and to fight back. We are told that the people of Israel could not sing the Lord’s song in a strange land. But, for blacks, their being depended upon a song. Through songs they built new structures for existence in an alien land. The spirituals enabled blacks to retain a measure of African identity while living in the midst of American slavery, providing both the substance and the rhythm to cope with human servitude....The spiritual, then, is the spirit of the people struggling to be free; it is their religion, their source of strength in a time of trouble. And if one does not know what trouble is, then the spiritual cannot be understood.

I Want Jesus to Walk with Me is simultaneously several different things: it is a song of lament, a song of personal invitation, and a statement of assurance that Jesus walks alongside those who suffer. Guenther writes, “The slaves’ association with Jesus was of such a personal nature they believed Jesus accompanied them daily on their earthly journey and helped them endure its pains and sorrows” (Guenther, 102).

As we continue on our own Lenten journey this year, you will hear several more of these “journey spirituals” during worship. May they bring you hope, strength and the assurance that Jesus does indeed walk with us along our paths.

Major Feast Days of the Episcopal Church To Be Celebrated in March

All Principal Feasts and Major Feasts of the liturgical calendar may be celebrated privately. In the absence of a priest, we will not have Holy Day services at this time, except those celebrated on a Sunday.

The Annunciation of Our Lord Jesus Christ to the Blessed Virgin Mary, which normally falls on March 25th, has been transferred to April 8th because March 25th falls during Holy Week this year.

The Feast of Saint Joseph—March 19th



Joseph was the husband of Jesus' mother Mary and Jesus' legal father. Joseph was visited by an angel when there were betrothed (but before they were married) after he found out that Mary was with child. The angel told him not to fear taking Mary as his wife because the baby was of the Holy Spirit. Although the Bible doesn't say when Joseph died, he is not mentioned as being present during the adult ministry of Jesus, and Christian tradition presents Mary as a widow. The last time Joseph appears in the canonical Gospels is in the story of the visit to Jerusalem when Jesus is 12 years old.

Lenten Program on the New Testament

Our Lenten Study Program offers a class called *The New Testament You Never Knew*, which features video lectures by N. T. Wright, a retired Bishop in the Church of England and professor of New Testament at the University of St. Andrews in Scotland, and Michael F. Bird, Dean of Theology at Ridley College in Melbourne, Australia. Each session includes a discussion of those video lectures.

The videos will explore the context, purpose, and meaning of the story of God in the New Testament. Sessions:

1. Is an overview of the New Testament including a look at the Gospels, the Acts of the Apostles, the letters of Paul, the letters of the other apostles and teachers, and the Book of Revelation.
2. Is a look at the context in which the New Testament was written and the world in which Jesus and his apostles lived.
3. Presents the life and death of Jesus as presented in the New Testament.
4. Looks at the meaning the Resurrection of Jesus – The singular event that began the church.
5. Looks at the ministry of Paul which spread the gospel throughout Asia Minor, Greece and into Rome itself.

Holy Week

Palm Sunday *The Sunday of the Passion*

8:15 a.m.—Trinity Chapel

10:30 a.m.—St. Paul's

On Palm Sunday the Church commemorates Christ's entry into Jerusalem to accomplish his saving work by dying and rising again. The liturgy of the day has two distinctive features, the procession and the reading of the Passion Gospel.

Maundy Thursday

Mass of The Lord's Supper

7:00 p.m.—St. Paul's

Maundy Thursday marks a new beginning, the beginning of the end. From this point on, our Christian worship is a continuum through to Easter Morning. The Mass of the Lord's Supper on Maundy Thursday recalls the institution of the Holy Communion as we obey Christ's command to "do this in remembrance of me." Following the Mass, the altars are stripped and crosses and candles are removed from the body of the church to signify the last stripping away of earthly things from the life of Christ as he prepared himself for his fate in the stark bareness of Gethsemane. The Reserved Eucharist is transferred to the altar in St. Elizabeth's Chapel where watch will be kept until 9:30 p.m.

Good Friday

The Liturgy of The Lord's Passion

12:00 noon—Trinity Chapel

7:00 p.m.—St. Paul's

The service for Good Friday is divided into four parts: the Ministry of the Word, the Proclamation of the Cross, the Intercessions, the Holy Communion. It is the narration of the events leading to the crucifixion historically from St. John's Gospel that lies at the heart of the service.

Maundy Thursday Vigil Before the Altar of Repose

The Maundy Thursday *Vigil before the Altar of Repose* is a prayer and watch that commemorates Jesus' request to his disciples to pray with him in the Garden of Gethsemane. The vigil is often all night long. Our vigil will only last until 9:30 p.m. The vigil, which will take place in St. Elizabeth Chapel (the room behind the main altar at St. Paul's), will begin once the service and stripping of the altar and sanctuary is completed. Those wishing to take part in the vigil are asked to sign up for a specific time slot between 8:00 p.m. and 9:30 p.m. A sign-up sheet will be posted at both Trinity Chapel and St. Paul's. Time slots are in 15-minute increments. You certainly may stay longer if you wish, especially if there is no person signed up after your time slot.

Since it will be dark outside when people leave, is there a gentleman or two who would stay to make sure everyone gets out to their cars safely? Please add your name to the bottom of the sign-up sheet.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR ST. PAUL'S COFFEE HOUR HOSTS AND HOSTESSES

**THANK YOU FOR VOLUNTEERING
TO HELP WITH OUR COFFEE HOUR!**



1. Plan to arrive at church between 10:00 and 10:15 a.m. so you can prepare what is needed for coffee hour. Check to see that there is coffee and water in the pot. Usually, someone from Parish Life will already have the coffee set up and all you need to do is plug in the coffee maker. If by chance the coffee maker has not been prepared and filled with water and coffee, the coffee can be found in the upper left cabinet next to the window (on the wall by the stove). Put enough cold water in for 24 cups and use the suggested amount of coffee as shown on the chart taped on the door inside the cabinet.
2. If you brought food to serve, place it on a tray and cover with a napkin or foil, etc. You can place the tray of food on the serving table in the parish hall. If you did not bring food, you can find various quick breads in the freezer. Check the refrigerator first. When we are not sure if someone intends to bring food, we try to have two or three loaves of bread thawed and ready for our hosts to use. Slice the bread and place on a tray. Cover.
3. Set out napkins and any serving utensils, if needed.
4. Add fresh water to the electric tea pot.
5. Move a tray of coffee mugs to the counter.
6. If the coffee is perked and ready, you can remove the coffee grounds so that the coffee doesn't continue to perk and become too strong.
7. Fill a creamer with half 'n half, if available. Keep cool in refrigerator.
8. After communion, return to the kitchen. Turn on tea pot, uncover food, place cream on cart, and bring out bottled water from the refrigerator and place on counter.

CLEAN UP

Hand wash mugs, trays, creamer, and utensils.

Empty coffee pot and wash.

Bag up unused food--can be refrigerated and used for Bible Study on Tuesday mornings.

Wipe off tables in parish hall and counters and sink in kitchen.

Sweep in kitchen and parish hall.

Our parish is one of several local churches that join in serving meals at the Saturday Café, a program held at First Presbyterian Church on Alby Street that serves free lunches to those in need.

Upcoming dates in 2024 when the EPA will be responsible for providing and serving food include May 4th, July 20th, August 17th, and November 16th.

Would you like to help? We generally meet in the kitchen at First Presbyterian Church at 10:30 a.m. and are done by 12:30 p.m., but you are welcome to come for a shorter time if you wish. Bruce Bayer usually prepares the main part of the meal ahead of time, and side dishes and desserts are purchased. Each Saturday the Café plans for 65 people and about 40 people show up. The bulk of the leftovers are given to those who come.

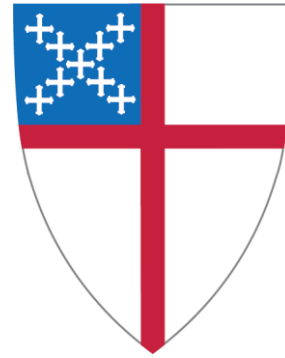
