Episcopal Parish of Alton,

Greetings to you during a busy summer! I have now been here for a little over a month and I must say that I am truly amazed. This parish is remarkable in so many ways, but it is clear to me that this is a parish of people who desire and crave to know where Christ is calling them next, constantly searching for Christ in their midst. I am excited to see where we will go and how we can continue to build the Kingdom of God!

I want to first address the buzz of excitement in the air over the General Convention and the election of the next Presiding Bishop. As you may have heard, the 28th Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church will be The Right Reverend Sean W. Rowe, the Episcopal Bishop of the Diocese of Northwestern Pennsylvania and provisional of Western New York. Bishop Rowe was first ordained as the youngest Episcopal Priest in the United States at the age of 24 years old in December 2000. He later was elected as a Bishop at the age of 32, making him the youngest member of the House of Bishops. At only the age of 49, the youngest of our candidates but with the most experience as a Bishop, he now has been elected to be our next Presiding Bishop.

I am beyond thrilled for the future of the Church. Presiding Bishop Michael Curry worked hard to challenge the Church and help guide us in the way of love. I'm looking forward to seeing how Bishop Rowe will lead the Church and what direction he will take us in. Bishop Rowe will have his installation occur sometime in the fall and then he will begin his nine-year term as our Presiding Bishop. I ask that all members of the Episcopal Parish of Alton continue to pray for the Episcopal Church and for Bishop Rowe. May we continue to pray and discern where Christ leads us next!

Furthermore, I want to thank you all who have taken the opportunity to pray during the last week of June after my pastoral letter went out. I encouraged all of our members to pray individually, at the Church, during the Daily Office, or during one of Eucharists for the many needs of the Parish. I asked that members pray for Bishop Burgess, the delegates, and members of the General Convention. I also asked for prayers for Connie Terry and Tony Springman and their families. Thank you all for your

continued prayers both individually and as a community. Prayer is more powerful than I could ever put into words, so please continue to pray and participate in the many worship opportunities we have at EPA.

I'm looking forward to the coming months and all the work we have set before us. Please know that you all continue to be in my prayers each day as I thank God for the blessing that is the EPA and the people here.

From the Organ Loft

Here I am, Lord.
It is I, Lord.
I have heard you calling in the night.
I will go, Lord, if you lead me.
I will hold your people in my heart.

These words were sung to us by Robbie Cupp during Fr. Garron's first Sunday service with us on June 2nd. When Robbie and I were planning the special music back in late March for this service, this song came to mind immediately. After researching a bit about the composer and how this piece evolved, I have an even greater appreciation for it!

In 1979, a 31-year-old Catholic Jesuit student studying theology in Berkeley, California was about to have a major change to his life path when a friend knocked on his door one Wednesday evening with an extraordinary request.

This Jesuit student, Dan Schutte, was a guitarist studying for the Catholic priesthood. He had just been asked to write a song for an upcoming diaconate ordination Mass that was to be held on Saturday...in just three days' time!

The requested song needed to have images of "the Word of God," "the Light of Christ," and "the bread and wine." To top it off, Mr. Schutte was sick with the flu, and later wrote, "I sat down at my desk with the guitar and a blank piece of staff paper praying 'God, if I'm going to do this for my friend, you're going to have to help me."

On the evening before the Saturday ordination Mass, Schutte delivered the song (pencil in hand), making edits along the way. "At that point," he states, "I really had no sense that the song would be any good, and I was actually very nervous."

This composition has become very well accepted over the last 40 plus years, and has found its way into many contemporary hymnals of various denominations. Schutte has had numerous letters over the years in regards to his song. One of the most meaningful for him came from an Army Captain that was serving in Afghanistan.

The Captain wrote that his troops would gather in a field for Mass, near where they were fighting, and their Chaplain would lead them in singing *Here I am, Lord*. "We stand here in this awful place, where we are asked to serve our country but fear for our own lives, and we sing *Here I am, Lord*," the Captain wrote.

During Lent we reflected on the Spiritual "Journey Song" *I Want Jesus to Walk With Me*. Like-wise, *Here I am, Lord* is also a modern-day "Journey Song."


Here I am, Lord, walking through this journey in my life with you.

These feasts will be celebrated at **Trinity Chapel** with a Mass and fellowship to follow, unless otherwise stated. You will notice that if the feast day is during the week, the Mass is held at 5:30 p.m. If it is on Saturday or a holiday, Mass will be held at Noon.



Independence Day Vigil— Wednesday, July 3rd, at St. Paul's

After the Feast Day Mass

Come for fellowship and stay to watch the fireworks!




The Feast of Saint Mary Magdalene—Monday, July 22nd at 5:30 p.m.

Mary Magdalene was among the women who accompanied and supported Jesus and the apostles. Mary was present at the crucifixion and was also the first to witness the resurrection, which Jesus told her to announce to his disciples. Because of this, she has been called the "apostle to the apostles." She is mentioned by name twelve times in the canonical gospels, more than most of the apostles and more than any other woman in the gospels, other than Jesus's family. Several non-canonical texts portray her as an apostle, as Jesus's closest and most beloved disciple and the only one who truly understood his teachings. Mary Magdalene is considered to be a saint by the Catholic, Eastern Orthodox, Anglican, and Lutheran denominations.



The Feast of Saint James the Apostle—Thursday, July 25th, at 5:30 p.m.



James and John, sons of Zebedee, are mentioned frequently in the gospels. James is sometimes called "the elder" or "the greater," to distinguish him from the other apostle James, the son of Alphaeus, who is called James the Less. James was a fisherman by trade. James and John left their father and their work as fishermen when called by Jesus. They became apostles, and with Peter formed an inner circle in the apostolic group. They witnessed the Transfiguration, the healing of Peter's mother-in-law, the raising of the daughter of Jairus, and the agony at Gethsemane. Jesus nicknamed the brothers James and John "sons of thunder." Legend claims that James was a great traveler and carried the gospel to Spain. He is the patron saint of that country where he is called Santiago. His work for the Lord in Jerusalem angered Herod, who had him killed about the year 42. He was the first of the apostles to be martyred and the only one whose martyrdom is mentioned in the Bible (Acts 12:1-2).

Schedule for Groups Responsible for Fellowship after Feast Day Services

Below is the list of the dates and times of upcoming feast days through September. The feast days are being held at Trinity Chapel and to prevent Trinity from being held responsible for each feast day, we will all pitch in to provide refreshments for the fellowship following the service.

I have added the name of a parish organization to each date. The organization name listed will be responsible for the refreshments served during fellowship time, which means setting up and cleaning up as well.

When your group is assigned to a feast day, it should take only two to three people to bring food and beverages, set up, and clean up. That means another two or three people could be in charge the next time the group is assigned to a feast day. The individual groups will need to organize who will be in charge at their various assigned dates. Of course, the support of the whole organization would bring a good number of people to the feast day service and make for a livelier fellowship time! We will not know ahead of time how many people will be attending. So far, we've had between 10 and 18.

Wine glasses and paper products are already at Trinity Chapel in the kitchen.

What are options? Food and beverages can be whatever you want--provide cheese, crackers and fruit; pick up pizza; or make desserts. There are many possibilities.



The next **Pet Food Pantry** will be held **July 7th**. The Pet Food Pantry is open one hour monthly, usually on the first Sunday of the month, from 12:30-1:30 p.m. People may enter St. Paul's through the Market Street entrance.



In June, the Pet Food Pantry provided food for 98 cats and 35 dogs. Father Garron, Marti LoRusso, Byron Sever, Donna Taylor, and Mimi Almonroeder handed out dry and wet food, treats, and pet accessories. The pantry has again received a gift of cat food by a person, wanting to remain anonymous, who works for Purina.

The Pet Food Pantry is supported entirely by donations of pet food and monetary gifts from our parish and community members. Baskets for donations of pet food are located near the entrance at both Trinity and St. Paul's. Monetary donations are also much appreciated! 

In July, we will be discussing A World Lit Only by Fire: The Medieval Mind and the Renaissance: Portrait of an Age by William Manchester.

From tales of chivalrous knights to the barbarity of the Inquisition and the misery of the Black Death, no era has been a greater source of awe, horror, and wonder than the Middle Ages. In graceful prose, and with the authority of his extraordinary gift for narrative history, William Manchester leads us from a civilization teetering on the brink of collapse to the grandeur of its rebirth during the Renaissance, a dense explosion of energy that spawned some of history's greatest poets, philosophers, painters, adventurers, and reformers, as well as some of its most spectacular villains. The result is an unforgettable journey into the medieval mind, as Manchester ingeniously re-creates the lives of ordinary people and offers vivid portraits of the era's most astonishing figures, such as Galileo, Machiavelli, Anne Boleyn, and Ferdinand Magellan.




