

# From the Organ Loft

As we begin this season of Advent I am reminded of the phrase 'hurry up and wait!' How often are we driving down the road in a rush only to be stopped by that pesky stoplight that just happens to turn yellow too soon before we can slide through it!

Advent is our liturgical season of deliberate 'expectant waiting' and reflective preparation for the celebration of the Nativity of Christ. So often, especially musically, it is tempting in many denominations to gloss over Advent selections and 'hurry on' to the more popular and well-known Christmas tunes. This is unfortunate, but the short Christmas to Epiphany season makes it hard to incorporate all the Christmas hymns that we would like to sing during those few services.

The word 'Advent' comes from the Latin 'adventus' meaning 'coming.' It is believed that Advent began to be celebrated as a church season sometime in the mid 500's-probably introduced by the Catholic Council of Tours to require monks to fast every day in the month of December until Christmas.

The Advent wreath tradition had its roots in the 16th century- originally a fir wreath with 24 candles (the 24 days before Christmas starting December 1st.) By the 19th century the awkwardness of having so many candles on the wreath reduced the number to the four that we now know that are represented as the candles of hope, peace, joy and love-with the Christ candle in the center.

As an interesting trivia, probably the earliest (oldest) of what is considered an Advent hymn is Mary's Magnificat which can be found in Luke 1:46-55. In this scripture passage Mary highly praises God for keeping God's promises to Abraham. The text of the Magnificat has been set to numerous pieces of music over the centuries. We recently sang one of these during our Even Song service on November 10 (#438 Tell out my

soul). Let's take the time this Advent to not 'rush' the season but wait 'expectantly' for the Christ Child.


## Worship Change: Eucharistic Prayer I during Advent

During the time of Advent, we will switch to Rite I Eucharistic Prayer I to set our minds and hearts on what is taking place during this Advent season. You won't notice any difference in responses to the prayers, but you will notice that the Priest says a little more during the prayers and some of the page numbers for the Eucharist may be different!

After Advent we will go back to our normal use of Rite I Eucharistic Prayer II.

# Major Feast Days of the Episcopal Church To Be Celebrated in December and January

Fr. Garron will be celebrating all Principal Feasts and Major Feasts of the liturgical calendar as noted below. These feasts will be celebrated at **Trinity Chapel** with a Mass and fellowship to follow, unless otherwise stated. If the feast day is during the week, the Mass is held at 5:30 p.m. If it is on Saturday or a holiday, Mass will be held at Noon.

# The Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe— Thursday, December 12th at 5:30 p.m.

Our Lady of Guadalupe is Jesus Christ's mother, the Virgin of Guadalupe. She appeared to Juan Diego as he walked to Mass on a Saturday morning in December 1531. Juan Diego told the unbelieving Franciscan bishop of the sighting and Mary directed Juan Diego to gather flowers from the hilltop where roses grew – unusual for winter, even in Mexico. He collected the flowers in his cloak and as the roses fell to the ground before the bishop, Mary's image appeared and it was just as he had seen in Mary's first appearance to him. The bishop fell to his knees. Mary chose to appear before a common man which reminds us of her love for all people, through a kind and benevolent God.



# The Feast of St. Thomas the Apostle — Saturday, December 21st at Noon


Thomas's skepticism regarding the resurrection of Jesus is well-known. In <u>John 20:24-29</u>, we read that Thomas was absent when the resurrected Jesus first appeared to the other disciples. When they told him about their miraculous encounter, he expressed doubt, saying he needed to see and feel Jesus' wounds to believe. Later, Jesus appeared to Thomas and invited him to touch his wounds, leading to Thomas's profound profession of faith, "My Lord and my God!"



# The Feast of St. Stephen, Deacon and Martyr — Thursday, December 26th at 5:30 p.m.

St. Stephen's story tells us that we should never be afraid of proclaiming the Gospel. While men could kill his body, his death glorified the Lord – and won him the martyr's crown in heaven. St. Stephen was one of the seven made responsible above all for charity. But it was impossible to separate charity from faith. This is the first lesson we learn from St. Stephen: charity and the proclamation of faith always go hand in hand.





# The Feast of St. John The Evangelist — Friday, December 27th at 5:30 p.m.

John was called while mending his nets to follow Jesus and became the beloved disciple of Jesus. He wrote the fourth Gospel, three Epistles and the Apocalypse. His passages on the pre-existence of the Word, who by His Incarnation became the light of the world and the life of our souls, are among the finest of the New Testament. He is the evangelist of the divinity of Christ and His fraternal love. With James, his brother, and Simon Peter, he was one of the witnesses of the Transfiguration. At the Last Supper, he leans on the Master's breast. At the foot of the cross, Jesus entrusts His Mother to his care. John's

pure life kept him very close to Jesus and Mary in years to come.

#### Holy Innocents — Saturday, December 28th at Noon

King Herod was a jealous king, placed in power by the Roman Empire. Like most kings he wanted more power, not less power. Then, out of the east came the wise men on camels bearing fancy gifts, asking one question: where could they find the newly born king of the Jews? They added "We have seen His star in the east and have come to worship Him" (Matthew 2:2). They didn't come all this way to see King Herod but another king. The Feast of the Holy Innocents, also called Childermas or Innocents' Day is a feast day in remembrance of the massacre of young children in Bethlehem by King Herod in his attempt to kill baby Jesus.



#### The Holy Name — Wednesday, January 1st at 5:30 p.m.

St. Paul tells us in his Letter to the Philippians, "at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, / of those in heaven and on earth and under the earth" (2:10). The name of Jesus was first spoken by an angel and is the cause of adoration by the heavenly court. It is a name reverenced especially during the Mass, as the General Instruction of the Roman Missal instructs the priest to bow his head at the mention of Jesus' name (see No. 275). It is a name that evil fears, and when invoked can cast out demons. We honor and celebrate the name of Jesus because the name of God deserves reverence. By celebrating this feast, we seek to make reparation for the irreverent use of God's name and restore it to proper dignity.





#### The Epiphany — Monday, January 6th at 5:30 p.m.

Epiphany has been part of traditional Christian worship since at least the fourth century. In the traditional Western Church calendar, the coming of the Magi is recalled as twelve days after Christmas, on 6th January which is called Epiphany. The day before is called the Twelfth Night, which is traditionally when Christmas decorations are taken down. This Epiphany is the idea that the Gentiles first came to know of the incarnation of God, through the Magi, when the baby Jesus was revealed for who he was. Epiphany is therefore also sometimes unofficially known as "The Three Kings' Day".

#### Confession of St. Peter — Saturday, January 18th at Noon

The proclamation of Jesus as Christ is fundamental to Christology; the Confession of Peter and Jesus' acceptance of the title "Messiah" form a definitive statement in the New Testament narrative regarding the person of Jesus Christ. In this New Testament narrative, Jesus not only accepts the titles Christ and *Son of God*, but declares the proclamation a divine revelation by stating that his Father in Heaven had revealed it to Peter, unequivocally declaring himself to be both Christ and the Son of God.

#### **Anthony Louis Springman Memorial Scholarship**

After the passing of our beloved Junior Warden Emeritus, Tony Springman, the Vestry voted in favor of honoring Tony through a Scholarship. After many conversations, it was approved to have a scholarship set up in honor of Tony at SIUE, where Tony had attended during his first two years of undergraduate studies before transferring to Vanderbilt University.

The scholarship is intended for those enrolled in the Graduate level program for Education Administration with an emphasis on social sciences. Preference will be given to graduate students who had previously attended either the Episcopal Parish of Alton or were graduates of Marquette High School.

The total to have the Scholarship enacted in January 2025 while giving us time to set up an endowed fund is \$30,000. Tony's family have already promised \$15,000 and the Vestry has currently raised \$500.

The balance of \$14,500 is to be raised over the course of the next five years in order to set up an endowed fund that will supply a yearly \$1,000 scholarship to a student in need. The Vestry and Springman family believe we will be able to raise this money, but we need your help! Will you join Fr. Garron, the Springman family and the Parish in helping not only remember Tony, but helping students in need in our community?


# **Results of Stewardship Campaign**

## The Origin, Meaning and Importance of Advent

Starting in the month of December the altars of St. Paul's Episcopal Church and Trinity Chapel as well as millions of other Catholic, Orthodox, Anglican / Episcopalian, Lutheran, Methodist and Presbyterian churches will be displaying a wreath that will be adorned with three purple candles, a pink candle and some will have a large white candle in the middle of the wreath as well. The wreath adorned with the candles signifies the beginning of the advent season.



The earliest known festivities of the Advent season began as early as the 4th century and were believed to be introduced by "The Council of Tours 567," a group established by the Roman Catholic Church in Medieval times. The season began as a period of strict fasting everyday until Christmas which dwindled to a fasting day three times a week over the next few centuries. The number of ways Advent was celebrated greatly differentiated among countries and denominational parishes throughout the centuries. By the thirteenth century, the act of fasting during Advent was no longer observed.

The tradition of the Advent Wreath began in Protestant parishes around the 16th century. The practice of lighting the Advent wreath quickly spread throughout all Europe as well as other countries and was adopted by numerous Christian denominations. Leading up to modern times, the tradition of the Advent wreath and candles began to take shape as practiced today and holds a very symbolic meaning for the season. The evergreen branches of the wreath symbolize the nature of God and his never-ending love, mercy, faithfulness and immortality as well as being a symbol of hope and renewal in the gift of everlasting life through his son Jesus Christ.

The five candles on the wreath also have significance with varying meaning and liturgical practices and customs from denomination to denomination. The meaning of the wreath and candle most associated with the Anglican/Episcopal parishes of North America are:

- 1. The first purple candle, lit on the first week of Advent is referred to as the "PROHECY CANDLE". It symbolizes hope and commemorates Isaiah and all the prophets that foretold the coming of our Savior Jesus Christ.
- 2. The second purple candle, lit on the second week of Advent, is referred to as the "BETHLEHEM CANDLE" representing peace. It symbolizes faith, signifying Mary and Joseph's trip to Bethlehem in preparation of the birth of our Savior.
- 3. The pink candle is the candle that is lit the third week of Advent and is known as 'THE SHEPHERD'S CANDLE". It is a symbol of joy at the birth of Jesus and of reaching the mid-point of Advent.
- 4. The fourth purple advent candle is "THE ANGELS CANDLE". Representing peace and love, and reminding us of the Angel's message, it marks the beginning of the last week of Advent as we anticipate the birth of Jesus Chris our Savior.

The white "CHRIST CANDLE" is lit on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day representing the life of Jesus. It symbolizes the pure and sinless life he led. Advent is the season of commemorating Jesus' birth on earth as well as the anticipation and hope of his second coming. Advent serves as a reminder of what the Christmas season is truly about. it should be a time of joy in reflection of Jesus' birth and also be a time of prayer, repentance, healing reconciliation, generosity and kindness.

It's hard to believe, but the Annual meeting is fast approaching! On Sunday, January 26, 2025, we will hold only one service at St Paul's at 10:30 a.m. After the service, we will hold our Annual meeting in Heneghan Hall.

During the course of the Annual meeting, reports from the different ministries are noted, the 2025 budget is approved, and several different addresses are made on the current state of the Parish and what the coming year will hopefully look like.

It's also the time where the Parish comes together and votes for several key leadership roles in the governance of the Parish. This year there will be elections for four vestry positions. There will also be elections for two lay delegates to Diocesan Synod who also serve as the Darrow Deanery representatives.

The Vestry advises the Rector on the needs, interests, and concerns of the Parish members. They also take an active role in the Parish by chairing or being involved in one of our many Commissions, assisting in subcommittees, and any other work needing to be done to continue the work and mission of the Parish. The Vestry meets at minimum once a month with commissions meeting at least once a month as well. The work of the Vestry is hands on and is vital work for the life of the Parish. Those discerning to join the Vestry should pray before putting their name forward.

So who's eligible to be a member of the Vestry or be a Delegate? Those who wish to run for Vestry and for the Delegate positions must be Communicants in Good Standing as defined by the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of Springfield, be eighteen years of age, and be a contributing member of the Parish.

Many wonder what it means to be a member of the Parish, especially a "communicant in good standing". To this question we turn to Canon 36 of the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of Springfield which reads:

#### Of Members of the Church

#### Section 1.

All persons who have received the sacrament of Holy Baptism with water, in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, whether in this Church or in another Christian Church, and whose Baptisms have been duly recorded in this Church, are members thereof.

#### Section 2.

All members of this Church who have received Holy Communion in this Church at least three times during the preceding year are to be considered communicants of this Church.

#### Section 3.

All communicants of this Church who for the previous year have been faithful in corporate worship, unless for good cause prevented, and have been faithful in working, praying and giving for the spread of the Kingdom of God, are to be considered communicants in good standing.

#### Section 4.

Communicants sixteen years of age or older are to be considered adult communicants.

As we draw closer to the Annual meeting, take the time to pray and discern whether you feel the call to be a member of the Vestry or a Delegate. To nominate, please have another communicant in good standing nominate you and send an email to <a href="mailto:episcopalalton@gmail.com">episcopalalton@gmail.com</a> who will record the nomination and notify Fr. Garron. Nominations can be made on the floor of the Annual meeting, but we strongly encourage you to <a href="mailto:send">send</a> nominations in before Sunday, January 12<sup>th</sup>, so we have time to verify and announce our slate of candidates.


