

Indeed, we have spent much time exploring a dark and mournful period in our faith and lives through the season leading up to the passion and death of our Lord and Savior, that has ended triumphantly in the resurrection, which brings with it the promise of life everlasting through faith in Christ Jesus our Lord. Over the next few weeks, we will be walking with the resurrected Jesus and looking forward to His glorious ascension.

While we have moved out of the very busy time that is Holy Week, this parish is in no way slowing down, although we will find time over the next couple of weeks to catch our breath before the energy ramps up again. Today, May 1st, we will be hosting, through the hard work and dedication of the Episcopal Church Women, this year's Cinco de Mayo Puzzle Fiesta, which is also on the Feast of St. Phillip and St. James the Apostles. There will be a full eucharistic celebration at 5:00 p.m. ahead of the festivities, which begin at 6:00 p.m.

On Saturday, May 3rd, our parish will volunteer at the Saturday Café event hosted by our friends, First Presbyterian Church. We will be serving lunch and snacks to the community as a means of outreach and service to others. Volunteers for this event are needed to help in preparing and serving the meals, and for the cleanup that will follow. We will meet at First Presbyterian at 10:00 a.m. that morning and will finish around 2:00 p.m. Please come out and join us!

May 11th is Mother's Day. Be sure to be at service at Trinity and St. Paul's that morning to help us celebrate the women that the Episcopal Church Men will select as this year's "Mother of the Year."

Vestry will be meeting on Tuesday, May 20th, at 6:30 p.m. in the conference room at St. Paul's. As a reminder, all confirmed members of the parish are welcomed to join the vestry for this meeting as observers of the parish's business. All reports will be due on Saturday, May 17th, by 5:00 p.m.

May 31st at 12:00 p.m. is the Feast of the Visitation of the Blessed Virgin. Service will be held at Trinity Chapel with light refreshment fellowship to follow provided by the Altar Guild.

Wow, there is a LOT going on during the month of May, and I am sure I have forgotten something of great importance! So, remember to go out and enjoy the beautiful weather that this month will bring. I cannot recommend highly enough, spending time in our beautiful garden. Bring a book. Chat with friends. Commune with God in the midst of His creation. From the Organ Loft

My music classes that I teach at school recently finished a study of Gustav Holtz (1874-1934), and particularly his orchestral suite **The Planets**. There are, as one can imagine, many overlaps with musicians/composers in their genres of music. What inspires a composer to create a particular piece of music? Why did he use those particular instruments in his composition? What was the composer trying to convey to us emotionally? These are questions that I brought up to my classes.

Gustav Holtz's connection to church music is an intricate one. His father was an Anglican organist/choirmaster in England. Young Holtz wanted to be a fine pianist, but from an early age was diagnosed with a nerve condition in one arm that hindered his progress. He was labeled a sickly, asthmatic child with poor eyesight. He took up the trombone (which he enjoyed and later played professionally) to strengthen his lung capacity.

Holtz was admitted to the Royal College of Church Musicians (RCM) for professional musical studies and had the opportunity to engage with some of England's finest church musicians at the close of the 19th century. One of his closest friends was Ralph Vaughan Williams, another budding Anglican church/hymn composer.

One of Holtz's Christmas tunes, composed in 1906, that is very familiar to us, is **Cranham** (named after the little village in Gloucestershire). It was set to the popular poem of the day 'A Christmas Carol' written in 1872 by Christina Rossetti. We know this seasonal hymn as **In the Bleak Mid-winter**.

Of course the beginning of WWI in 1914 changed the lives of everyone, including musicians and their outlook on compositions. Holtz' next composition reflected this.

The Planets (1914-1916)

i. Mars, the Bringer of War (1914)
ii. Venus, the Bringer of Peace (1914)
iii. Mercury, the Winged Messenger (1916)
iv. Jupiter, the Bringer of Jollity (1914)
v. Saturn, the Bringer of Old Age (1915)
vi. Uranus, the Magician (1915)
vii. Neptune, the Mystic (1915)

Inspired by the planets, each movement in this orchestral suite was designed to convey the different 'personality' of each one of the planets, and the emotions associated with it. Pluto was not included...it had not been discovered yet! Holtz originally wrote the suite for two pianos, but due to the scope of the work, decided to enlarge it into an orchestral work.

Mars, the first to be written (1914) was Holtz's critique of WWI. The Mars score is full of tension. The brass instrumentation is commanding, with the percussion building up the sense of dread and war-like atmosphere. It is no wonder that John Williams' 'Star Wars' music composed one hundred years later sounds so very much like it could have been composed by Holtz. Hum-m-m:!!

The most well-known of the movements is **Jupiter**. It is a very triumphant piece...full of bright brass and percussion. The middle section contains the standout tune **Thaxted** named after the English town that Holtz lived in from 1917 to 1925. This tune appears in many hymnals with the title 'I Vow to Thee My Country' or alternately 'O God Beyond All Praising'.

'I Vow to Thee My Country' (words by C. Rice) was sung at the wedding of Prince Charles and Princess Diana in 1981 and again at Diana's funeral in 1997. The tune was also played for the funeral of Queen Elizabeth II in 2022 and at King Charles III coronation in 2023.

I have used John Behnke's organ arrangement of **Thaxted** for many church services...including weddings and funerals. I am hoping to have a bell arrangement ready for us to play in the near future. It is certainly one of my favorite hymn tunes!

Major Feast Days of the Episcopal Church To Be Celebrated in May

Fr. Garron will be celebrating all Principal Feasts and Major Feasts of the liturgical calendar as noted below. These feasts will be celebrated at **Trinity Chapel** with a Mass and fellowship to follow, unless otherwise stated. You will notice that if the feast day is during the week, the Mass is held at 5:30 p.m. (unless otherwise noted.) If it is on Saturday or a holiday, Mass will be held at Noon.

The Feast of the Apostles Saint Philip and Saint James—Thursday, May 1st, 5:00 p.m. at St. Paul's

In the sixth century, the relics of the Apostles Philip and James were brought back to Rome from Constantinople and placed in what is today called the Church of the Holy Apostles. For this reason, we honor these two disciples together with one feast. Philip was most likely a follower of Saint John the Baptist and might have been a brother to Simon Peter and Andrew who were invited to follow Jesus. Upon his encounter with Jesus



who said, "Follow me," Philip obeyed. In his letter to the Corinthians, Saint Paul relates that the Lord appeared to James after His Resurrection. After Pentecost, James became the first bishop of the Church in Jerusalem. The Acts of the Apostles relates that James, as head of the Jerusalem Church, oversaw the First Council of Jerusalem and declared the final judgment on behalf of Peter.

No fellowship scheduled to follow the service due to the Puzzle Fiesta.

The Feast of the Ascension—Thursday, May 29th

We celebrate this feast as the completion of the Easter mysteries of the life, passion, death and resurrection of Jesus. One of the central themes is the kingship of Christ, and the theological implication is that the Ascension was the final redemptive act conferring participation in the divine life on all who are members of Christ.

Fellowship to follow the service provided by the Vestry.

The Feast of the Visitation of the Blessed Virgin Mary—Saturday, May 31st

The visitation is mentioned only in Luke's Gospel and tells us that Mary stayed with her cousin, Elizabeth, about three months. Mary returned home just before Elizabeth gave birth to Saint John the Baptist. The meeting of these two women was a joyful and unique event, as both found themselves pregnant in unusual circumstances. The visit symbolizes the mutual support and encouragement among believers.





Who was Joseph of Arimathea?

The Lenten season is past and on Easter Sunday we celebrated Jesus' rising from the dead. After Jesus' crucifixion, what happened to his body? He breathed his last breath stating, "It is finished," and The Roman Soldiers cast lots for his clothing, but what happened to Jesus' body? After his death, there was a wealthy man, known as Joseph of Arimathea, that went to Pontius Pilate and requested the body of Jesus.

So, who was Joseph of Arimathea? Little is really known about the man who went to Pontius Pilate and requested Jesus' corpse so he could give it the proper Jewish burial. At that time, a corpse would be wrapped in strips of linen that had been mixed in myrrh and aloe. The day his body was obtained and set up for burial was "The Day of Preparation," which was the sixth day of the week, or the day before "The Jewish Sabbath." So Joseph, with the help of Nicodemus, had to make haste with the burial ritual and had him placed in a tomb near the site of his crucifixion.

The exact location of Arimathea is not exactly known but by most accounts, Arimathea was a "hilly town of Jews," near Jerusalem.

According to the four major Gospels in *The New Testament*, the accounts of who Joseph of Arimathea was do vary. In the *Gospels of Mark and Luke*, he was a prominent member of the Sanhedrin, the group that strongly urged the crucifixion of Jesus. However, in the *Book of Matthew* he was simply referred to as a wealthy man that was a follower of Jesus. The *Books of Mark and Luke* describe Joseph of Arimathea as "a good and upright man" who was against the decision to crucify Jesus and never consented to his crucifixion. Due to his position in the Sanhedrin, it was also noted in the *Book of John* that Joseph of Arimathea was considered "a secret follower of Jesus", for fear of reprisal from the Jewish community.

It should also be noted that Jesus' burial fulfilled a Biblical prophecy in the *Book of Isaiah* 53:9 "He was assigned a grave with the wicked, and with the rich in his death, though he had done no violence, nor was any deceit in his mouth."


Second Saturdays: Healthy Living for a Holy Life


Evening Prayer in the Garden

ACA Group Ministry to Start in June



The Episcopal Parish of Alton is excited to announce an additional recovery ministry being offered at St. Paul's Episcopal Church. Bruce Bayer and Fr. Garron Daniels are helping start a chapter of Adult Children of Alcoholic and Dysfunctional Families (ACA). This group covers a lot of ground and is therefore open to anyone who wants to join in a lay person led, non-professional meeting. The meeting is open to people who are interested in twelve steps, twelve tradition recovery from childhood trauma and dysfunction, and the continuing effects that follow us into adulthood.

This marks the fourth recovery group to meet at St. Paul's. Currently there are three Alcoholics Anonymous meetings that occur here at the Church on a weekly basis. While these groups are not affiliated with the Church or any specific Church, the EPA has made an effort to offer space and a welcoming environment for them to meet and work. Just recently the EPA, with the help of a grant from the Diocese, installed a sink with counter space, shelves, and a mini fridge in the Recovery Ministry Conference Room for groups to use.

Should you be interested in the ACA, the group will meet on Saturday mornings at 9:00 a.m., beginning June 7th. Meetings will take place in the Recovery Ministry Conference Room that can be accessed using the Market Street entrance. become amazing leaders just as he was in academic institutions. The QR Code may be used to look at the webpage for the SIUE scholarship as well as to make donations directly to SIUE.




Book Club News

Dungeons & Dragons Intro Class begins May 22nd



Ignite Youth Choir to Perform on June 8th






