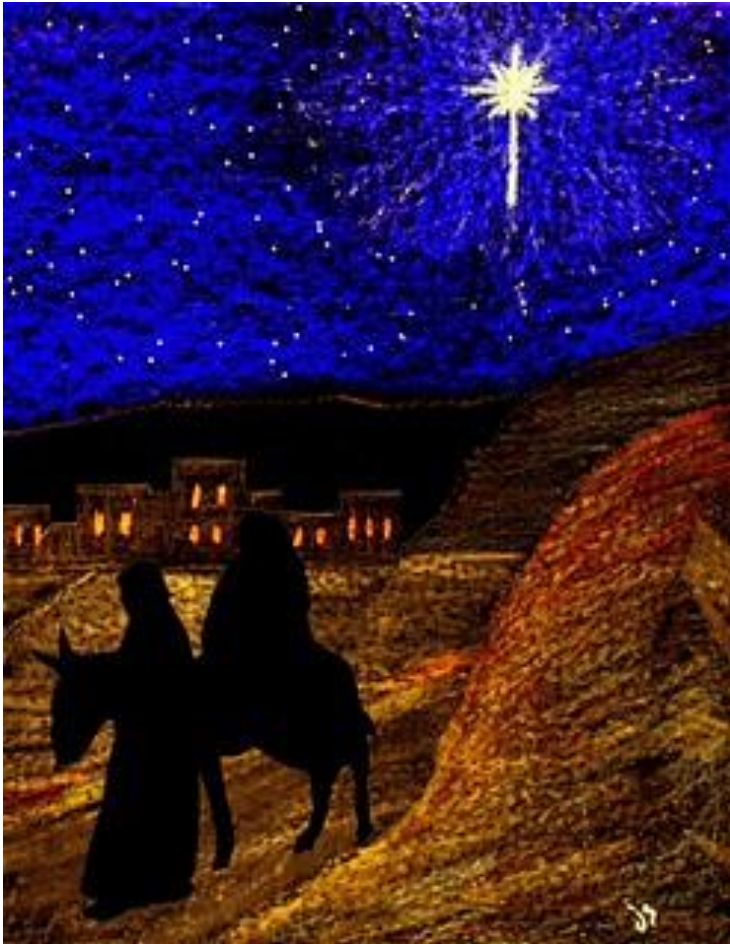

A Bidding Prayer

The Lessons

The First Reading: **Genesis 3: 8–15; 17–19**

The man and his wife heard the sound of the Lord God walking in the garden at the time of the evening breeze, and they hid themselves from the presence of the Lord God among the trees of the garden. But the Lord God called to the man, and said to him, "Where are you?" He said, "I heard the sound of you in the garden, and I was afraid, because I was naked; and I hid myself." He said, "Who told you that you were naked? Have you eaten from the tree of which I commanded you not to eat?" The man said, "The woman whom you gave to be with me, she gave me fruit from the tree, and I ate." Then the Lord God said to the woman, "What is this that you have done?" The woman said, "The serpent tricked me, and I ate." The Lord God said to the serpent,

“Because you have done this,
cursed are you among all animals
and among all wild creatures;
upon your belly you shall go,
and dust you shall eat

all the days of your life.
I will put enmity between you and the woman,
and between your offspring and hers;
he will strike your head,
and you will strike his heel.”

And to the man he said,

“Because you have listened to the voice of your wife,
and have eaten of the tree
about which I commanded you,
‘You shall not eat of it’,
cursed is the ground because of you;
in toil you shall eat of it all the days of your life;
thorns and thistles it shall bring forth for you;
and you shall eat the plants of the field.
By the sweat of your face
you shall eat bread
until you return to the ground,
for out of it you were taken;

*‘Adam lay ybounden’ is a 15th century carol whose title means ‘Adam lay bound.’ The carol reflects on the theological concept of the *felix culpa*, or ‘blessed fault,’ which argues that Adam’s original sin was necessary for the greater good of humanity’s redemption through the birth of Christ, and through Mary becoming the Queen of Heaven. It presents a paradoxical view that one can be grateful for the sin that made salvation possible.*

The Fourth Reading: **Baruch 4:36-5: 9**

For God will give you evermore the name, "Righteous Peace, Godly Glory." For they went out from you on foot, led away by their enemies; but God will bring them back to you, carried in glory, as on a royal throne. 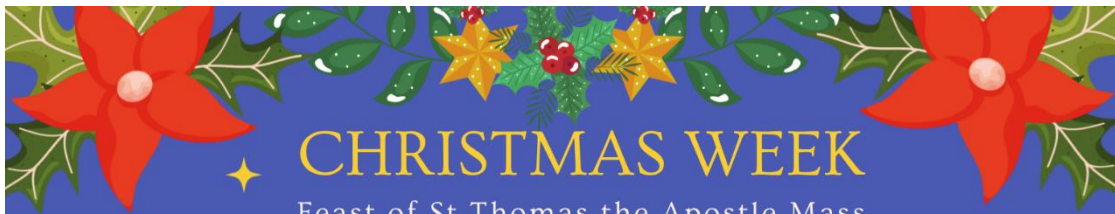
